Candidates must hold a Masters degree or equivalent. They should first obtain the agreement of the proposed thesis director and the director of the Laboratory, and then submit an application to the director of the School. THE SCHOOL

The School has around 180 doctoral students working in one of the three fields proposed: pure mathematics, applied mathematics and scientific computation, computer science. It is supported by two laboratories (the IMB, Institut de Mathématiques de Bordeaux (Bordeaux Mathematics Institute) UMR 5251 - and the LaBRI, Laboratoire Bordelais de Recherche en Informatique (Bordeaux Laboratory for research in Computer Science) UMR 5800) and three associated institutions (the CEA-CESTA, Commissariat à l'Énergie Atomique Centre d'Études Scientifiques et Techniques d'Aquitaine (Atomic Energy Commission, Aquitaine Centre for Scientific and Technical Studies) – the ENSEIRB, École Nationale Supérieure d'Électronique, Informatique et Radiocommunications de Bordeaux (Bordeaux National Engineering School in Electronics, Computing and Radiocommunications) - the INRIA, Institut National de Recherche en Informatique et Automatique (Na-

tional Institute for Research in Computing and Automation)), making a total of more than 300 full time research or research/ teaching staff.

– TRAINING OFFERED

In the course of their thesis, doctoral students follow about a hundred hours of training devoted to scientific awareness or to assistance with professional career openings. This training is aimed at giving the students the best opportunity to launch a successful career.

EDUCATIONAL OR INDUSTRIAL MONITORSHIP

In parallel with their thesis work, doctoral students have a possibility of undertaking a monitorship of initiation into tertiary education (64 hours of teaching per year) or industry (a part time R&D consultancy mission).

– PROFESSIONAL **RECRUITMENT OPPORTUNITIES**

The principal recruitment areas for the School's PhDs are in the academic and industrial sectors (researcher, university teaching/research, R&D doctor/engineer) both in France and abroad. The proportion of PhDs going into industry is about 45 %.

- Funding

Every doctoral student in the school has to have funding from some source (scholarship from the Education Ministry, funding from the CNRS, IN-RIA, CEA or a Region, research contract funding, CIFRE agreement with a company, etc.) For more information contact the intended thesis director or consult the School's web site.

INTERNATIONAL

The School has a policy of open recruitment, nationally and internationally (a third of doctoral students were awarded their Masters degree at universities other than Bordeaux and a quarter are not French nationals). The School also supports the establishment of co-direction of theses and medium term research visits abroad.
