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INTRODUCTION

THE theorem

Theorem (Shepherdson 59, RabinScott 59)

Every language recognized by a two-way automaton is regular.

Our contribution

We translate 2 way finite automata into

- new rewriting systems over words
- new rewriting systems over words-of-words

The **new** proofs

Idea 1-2:

The language accepted by a 2-way f.a. is the set of consequences of a finite set of axioms, via a *right-linear deduction system* ([Büchi-Hosken])

Proof 1: based on [Büchi, 1964], [Büchi-Hosken, 1970]

Proof 2: based on [M.O. Rabin, 1969]

The **new** proofs

Idea 3-4:

Construct an embedding $\varphi: A^* \times A^* \hookrightarrow A^{[2]}$ such that the binary relation $\operatorname{TRANS}(w, w')$:

$$\exists u, v \in A^*, \exists x \in A, w = \varphi(u, xv), w' = \varphi(ux, v)$$

is expressible as the transition-relation of some order 2 pushdown-automaton.

Proof 3: based on [Hague-Ong 2007] showing that the set of winning positions of an accessibility game over pushdown automaton of order 2, is Meyer-regular.

Proof 4: The relation TRANS(w, w') is MSO-definable in the structure $A^{[2]}$.

Proof is based on [Fratani, 2012] that gives an automatic characterisation of the definable subsets of $A^{[2]}$

TWO-WAY finite automata

Definitions

A finite two-way automaton is a tuple

$$\mathcal{A}=(Q,A,\otimes,\otimes,\Delta,I,F),$$

where Q is a finite set of states, $I \subseteq Q$ is the set of initial states $F \subseteq Q$ the set of final states, A is an alphabet, and \otimes and \otimes are special letters not in A.

We note $\widehat{A} := A \cup \{ \otimes, \otimes \}$.

A configuration of the two-way automaton ${\cal A}$ is a tuple

$$(q, u, v) \in Q \times \widehat{A}^* \times \widehat{A}^*.$$

Definitions

Given $a, a' \in \widehat{A}$, $u, v, u', v' \in \widehat{A}^*$, and $q, q' \in Q$, we write:

$$(q, u, av) \vdash_{\mathcal{A}} (q', ua, v) \text{ if } (q, a, q', \triangleright) \in \Delta$$

 $(q, ua, a'v) \vdash_{\mathcal{A}} (q', u, aa'v) \text{ if } (q, a', q', \triangleleft) \in \Delta$

A word $u \in A^{[1]}$ is *accepted* by A iff

$$(q_0, \epsilon, \otimes u \otimes) \vdash_{\mathcal{A}}^* (q_f, v, v')$$

with $q_0 \in I$ and $q_f \in F$, for some $v, v' \in \widehat{A}^*$.

Proof by REWRITING

The rewriting rules

Alphabet: $A \cup \{[p,q] \mid p,q \in Q\}$ Set D of deduction rules:

$$\overline{u[p,p]}$$

for all $u \in \widehat{A}^*$, $p \in Q$

$$\frac{ua[q,r]}{uab[p,s]}$$

$$\mathsf{if}\; (p,b,q,\triangleleft) \in \Delta, (r,a,s,\triangleright) \in \Delta$$

$$\frac{u[p,q],u[q,r]}{u[p,r]}$$

if
$$p, q, r \in Q$$
.

The rewriting rules

For every $u \in A^*$, $p, q \in Q$, $a \in A$:

$$(p,u,a)\vdash^* (q,u,a)$$

iff

$$\frac{}{ua[p,q]}D$$

Hence the language L recognized by A is equal to:

$$\{u \in A^* \mid \exists p \in I, \exists q \in F, \frac{}{\otimes u \otimes [p,q]} D\}$$

The proof

Theorem (Büchi-Hosken, 1970)

For every finite set D of right-linear deduction rules, the set of all provable words is a regular set.

By this theorem L is regular.

Proof by MSO logics over words

Proof by MSO over WORDS

The language P of provable words (modulo D) is the smallest subset $X \subseteq A^*$ such that:

$$\forall u \in \widehat{A}^*, p, q, r, s \in Q, (p, b, q, \triangleleft), (r, a, s, \triangleright) \in \Delta$$

$$u[p,p] \in X, \quad ua[q,r] \in X \rightarrow uab[p,s] \in X$$

$$(u[p,q] \in X \text{ and } u[q,r] \in X) \rightarrow u[p,r] \in X.$$

Hence there exists a MSO formula Φ , with only one free variable X, which is a set-variable, such that

$$A^*, v \models \Phi$$
 if and only if $v(X) = P$.

Proof by MSO over WORDS

Theorem (Rabin 1969)

The regular subsets of A^* are exactly the MSO-definable subsets of A^* .

It follows that P is regular, which implies that

$$L = \{u \in X^* \mid \exists p \in I, q \in F, \otimes u \otimes [p, q] \in P\}$$

is regular too.

WORDS of WORDS

Words of words

A word of words over A is a word over the alphabet A^* , i.e. a finite sequence of finite words over A.

Notation:

 $A^{[1]}$: the set A^* of words over A,

 $A^{[2]}$: the set of words of words over A.

Examples:

$$\overline{A} = \{a, b, c\}$$

abbcab, *abba*, ε are words

 $[a, bbc, b], [abba, \varepsilon, bb, bbbbca], [\varepsilon], []$ are words of words.

Concatenations:

$$aba \cdot_1 caaa = abacaaa$$

 $[aba, c] \cdot_2 [c, ba] = [aba, c, c, ba].$

Words of words

A language $L \subseteq A^{[2]}$ is said *Meyer-regular* iff, viewed as a language over $(A \cup \{"[", ", ", "]"\})^*$ it is regular.

(i.e. the metasymbols, square brackets and commas, are treated as ordinary symbols)

Encoding pairs of words

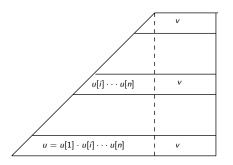


Figure: The encoding of (u, v)

Encoding pairs of words

$$arphi: A^{[1]} \hookrightarrow A^{[2]}$$

$$arphi(u,v) = [v,u_nv,u_{n-1}u_nv,\dots,uv]$$

$$arphi(cba,ba) = [ba,aba,baba,cbaba]$$

Encoding pairs of words

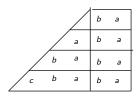


Figure: $\varphi(cba, ba)$

Encoding moves

For all
$$u, v \in A^{[1]}$$
 and $a \in A$,

$$\varphi(u, av) = [av, \dots, uav], \ \varphi(ua, v) = [v, av, \dots, uav]$$

and

$$[av, \ldots, uav] \xrightarrow{\mathsf{push}_2} \xrightarrow{\mathsf{pop}_1} [v, av, \ldots, uav].$$

$$[v, av, \ldots, uav] \xrightarrow{\mathsf{pop}_2} [av, \ldots, uav].$$

Proof by GAMES over 2-pushdowns

level 2 pushdowns

An level-2 pushdown automaton has:

- an input alphabet X
- a finite set of states Q
- a memory with contents in $A^{[2]}$
- a set of transitions

$$\Delta \subseteq \textit{Q} \times \textit{X} \times \textit{A} \times \textit{Q} \times \textit{O}$$

where

$$\mathcal{O} = \{\mathsf{pop}_1, \mathsf{pop}_2, \mathsf{push}_2\} \cup \{\mathsf{push}_1^a \mid a \in A\}.$$

level 2 pushdowns

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For a \in A, n \ge 1 and u, u_1, \dots, u_n \in A^{[1]},  pop_1([u_1, \dots, u_n]) = [pop_1(u_1), u_2, \dots, u_n] \quad \text{where } pop_1(au) = u   pop_2([u_1, \dots, u_n]) = [u_2, \dots, u_n] \quad \text{when } n > 1   push_1^a([u_1, \dots, u_n]) = [push_1^a(u_1), u_2, \dots, u_n] \quad \text{where } push_1^a(u) = au   push_2([u_1, \dots, u_n]) = [u_1, u_1, u_2, \dots, u_n]
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Games over level 2 pushdowns

Theorem (Hague-Ong2007)

Let \mathcal{A} be some order-2 pushdown automaton. Given a Meyer-regular set of configurations C, the set of configurations $\{c' \in Q \cdot A^{[2]} \mid \exists c \in C, c' \vdash_{\mathcal{A}}^* c\}$ is regular too.

The proof

Let $\mathcal A$ be a 2-way finite automaton with set of states Q, input-alphabet A. We construct a level-2 pushdown automaton, with set of states $Q \cup R$, stack-alphabet \widehat{A} and transitions such that:

$$(p, u, v) \mapsto p \cdot \varphi(u, v)$$

embeds the set configurations of $\ensuremath{\mathcal{A}}$ into the set of configurations of $\ensuremath{\mathcal{B}}$ and

$$(p, u, v) \vdash_{\mathcal{A}}^{*} (q, u', v') \Leftrightarrow p \cdot \varphi(u, v) \vdash_{\mathcal{B}}^{*} q \cdot \varphi(u', v').$$

The proof

$$u \in L \Leftrightarrow$$

$$\exists u', v' \in \widehat{A}^* \bigvee_{p \in I, q \in F} (p, \varepsilon, \otimes u \otimes) \vdash_{\mathcal{A}}^* (q, u, v') \Leftrightarrow$$

$$\exists u', v' \in \widehat{A}^* \bigvee_{p \in I, q \in F} p\varphi(\varepsilon, \otimes u \otimes) \vdash_{\mathcal{B}}^* q \cdot \varphi(u, v') \Leftrightarrow$$

$$\exists w' \in \widehat{A}^{[2]}, \bigvee_{p \in I, q \in F} p \cdot [\otimes u \otimes] \vdash_{\mathcal{B}}^* q \cdot w'.$$

Since $\widehat{A}^{[2]}$ is Meyer-regular, by [Hague-ong 2007] , for very $p \in I, q \in F$, the set $\{[\circledcirc u \circledcirc] \mid p \cdot [\circledcirc u \circledcirc] \vdash_{\mathcal{B}}^* q \cdot \widehat{A}^{[2]} \}$ is Meyer-regular, hence L is regular.

Proof by MSO over

WORDS-of-WORDS

MSO over words-of-words

We consider the structure

$$\mathcal{S}^{**}_{\mathcal{A}} = \langle \mathcal{A}^{[2]}, (\mathsf{letter}^{**}_{a})_{a \in \mathcal{A}}, \mathsf{son}^{*}_{1}, \mathsf{clone}^{*}_{1}, \mathsf{son}_{2}, \mathsf{clone}_{2} \rangle$$

- S_A^{**} , $v \models letter_a^{**}(x)$ holds when $v(x) = [a \cdot_1 u] \cdot_2 v$ for some $u \in A^{[1]}$, $v \in A^{[2]}$,
- S_A^{**} , $v \models son_1^*(x, y)$ holds when $v(x) = [u] \cdot_2 w$ and $v(y) = [au] \cdot_2 w$, for some $a \in A$, $u \in A^{[1]}$, and $w \in A^{[2]}$,
- S_A^{**} , $v \models clone_1^*(x)$ holds when $v(x) = [aau] \cdot_2 w$ for some $a \in A, w \in A^{[2]}$,
- \mathcal{S}_{A}^{**} , $v \models son_2(x, y)$ holds when $v(y) = [u] \cdot_2 v(x)$ for some $u \in A^{[1]}$,
- \mathcal{S}_A^{**} , $\mathbf{v} \models \mathsf{clone}_2(x)$ holds when $\mathbf{v}(x) = [u, u] \cdot_2 w$ for some $u \in A^{[1]}$ and $w \in A^{[2]}$.

MSO over words-of-words

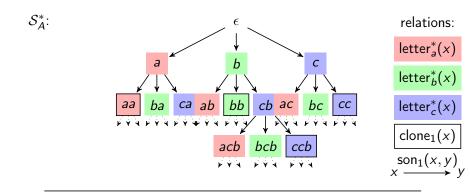
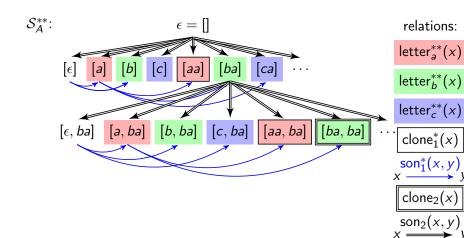


Figure: Structure S_A^* for $A = \{a, b, c\}$ (partial representations).

MSO over words-of-words



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definability within MSO

Lemma

Given a two-way finite automaton \mathcal{A} over a finite alphabet A, the set $[L(\mathcal{A})] = \{[u] \mid u \in L(\mathcal{A})\} \subseteq A^{[2]}$, is definable by an MSO formula $\Psi(x)$ over $\mathcal{S}_{\mathcal{A}}^{**}$.

definability within MSO

The key-idea is that one can express , within MSO over $\mathcal{S}_{\mathcal{A}}^{**}$, the movement relation:

$$(u, av) \vdash (ua, v)$$

We construct a MSO formula $\operatorname{Link}(*,*)$ such that, for all $y,z\in\operatorname{Im}(\varphi)$,

$$\mathcal{S}_A^{**} \models \operatorname{Link}(y, z)$$

iff there exist $u \in A^{[1]}$, $a \in A$, $v \in A^{[1]}$ such that

$$y = \varphi(u, av)$$
 and $z = \varphi(ua, v)$



definability within MSO



$$\operatorname{Link}(\mathbf{y}, \mathbf{z}) := \exists t, \operatorname{\mathsf{son}}_2(\mathbf{y}, t) \land \mathit{clone}_2(t) \land \mathit{son}_1^*(\mathbf{z}, t)$$

lemma "a la Fatou"

Lemma (Fatou property)

Let $L \subseteq A^{[1]}$ such that [L] is MSO-definable in $A^{[2]}$. Then L is MSO-definable in $A^{[1]}$.

This lemma can be deduced from the characterisation of definable subsets by oracle-automata over the "differential notation" of the words-of-words([Fratani 2012]).

End of the proof

Since [L] is MSO-definable in $A^{[2]}$, L is MSO-definable in $A^{[1]}$ (by Fatou property) and by Rabin's theorem, L is regular.

Perspectives

- Extend Shepherdson's theorem to words of words? to $A^{[n]}$ for $n \ge 2$?
- Find *logical proofs* for problems about transductions?
- Find new *algebraic proofs* for Shepherdson's theorem. Can we use the links with the free inverse monoid?
