

## Groups acting on context-free graphs

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## INTRODUCTION

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A p-structure over some graph  $\Gamma$  is a pair  $(\mathcal{A}, \varphi)$  where  $\mathcal{A}$  is a pushdown-automaton and  $\varphi : \mathcal{C}(\mathcal{A}) \to \Gamma$  is a graph isomorphism.

#### Theorem (Muller-Schupp TCS 1985)

A graph is context-free iff it has some p-structure.

#### Theorem (Muller-Schupp JCSS 1983)

The Cayley graph of a group G is context-free iff G is virtually free.

- 1- Prove Muller-Schupp's theorem (about c.f. groups) by geometric means (tilings)
- 2- Extend Muller-Schupp's theorem to the groups  $G := Aut(\Gamma)$ , for  $\Gamma$  context-free graphs.
- 3- Describe (part of ) the landscape around this theorem.

#### the combination lemma

#### Lemma

Let G be a group, with generating set  $\{g_x \mid x \in X \cup \bar{X}\}$  (with  $g_{\bar{x}} = g_x^{-1}$ ) that acts on a set

$$\Omega = (\bigcup_{x \in X \cup \bar{X}} \Omega_x) \dot{\cup} \Omega_0$$

satisfying the two conditions :

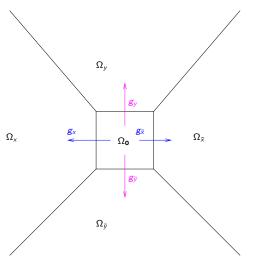
- (i) all the sets  $\Omega_{\alpha}$  ( $\alpha \in X \cup \bar{X} \cup \{0\}$ ) are non-empty
- (ii) for every  $x \in X \cup \bar{X}$ ,  $g_x \odot \bar{\Omega}_{\bar{x}} \subseteq \Omega_x$ .

Then

(iii) G is freely generated by the family  $(g_x)_{x \in X \cup \bar{X}}$ .

(iv) 
$$\forall g \in G - \{1_G\}, (g \odot \Omega_0) \cap \Omega_0 = \emptyset.$$

# Cutting up graphs

#### tree-sets

#### Definition

A set of subsets  $\mathcal{F}$  of a given set  $\Omega$  is called a tree set if, for every elements  $\mathcal{C}, D \in \mathcal{F}$ :

- $\bar{C} \in \mathcal{F}$ ,
- 2  $C \subseteq D$  or  $C \subseteq \overline{D}$  or  $\overline{C} \subseteq D$  or  $\overline{C} \subseteq \overline{D}$
- 3 the set  $\{B \in \mathcal{F} \mid C \subseteq B \subseteq D\}$  is finite.

#### Theorem (Dunwoody 1979)

If  $\mathcal{F}$  is a tree set :

$$V = \{ [C]_{\sim} \mid C \in \mathcal{C} \}, E = \{ [C], [\bar{C}] \mid C \in \mathcal{F} \}$$

defines a tree, denoted by  $T(\mathcal{F})$ .

cuts

A cut is a subset  $C \subseteq V$  such that C and  $\overline{C}$  are both connected and non-empty and  $\delta C$  is finite.

## tree-sets of cuts

#### Theorem (Diekert-Weiss 2013)

Suppose that a group G acts on a graph  $\Gamma$  which is accessible, locally finite and co-finite. Then  $\Gamma$  admits a tree-set  $\mathcal{C}$ , consisting of cuts of  $\Gamma$ , which is closed under the action of G and has only finitely many orbits under G.

In the case of a context-free graph : every class  $[C]_{\sim}$  is finite. We note  $\mathcal{S}:=\mathcal{T}(\mathcal{C}).$ 

# Context-free Cayley graphs

For every subset P of V(S) and edge  $e \in E(S)$  we note

$$\#_i(e, P) := \mathsf{Card}(\{ge \mid g \in G, gs(e) \notin P, gt(e) \in P\}),$$

$$\#_{o}(e,P) := \operatorname{Card}(\{ge \mid g \in G, gs(e) \in P, gt(e) \notin P\}).$$

#### Definition

Let  $P \subseteq V(S)$  and  $e \in E(S)$ .

The set P is called e-equilibrated iff  $\#_i(e, P) = \#_o(e, P)$ .

#### Definition

A subset  $P \subseteq V(S)$  is called *equilibrated* iff

 $\forall e \in E(S), P \text{ is } e\text{-equilibrated}.$ 

It is called *connected* iff the induced subgraph  $\langle P \rangle$  of  $\mathcal S$  is connected. It is called *complete* iff

$$\forall C \in C_{\mathrm{opt}}, \exists g \in G, [gC]_{\sim} \in P$$

(in other words : it is a set of representatives for  $G\setminus (\mathcal{C}_{\mathrm{opt}}/\sim)$ ).

#### **Proposition**

There exists a subset P of V(S) which is finite, equilibrated, connected and complete.

Proof of the Proposition in the Cayley case : Start with some P which is "partially" equilibrated i.e. for every e such that  $Ge \cap P \neq \emptyset$ , P is e-equilibrated.

- step 1 :  $Gs(e) \cap P \neq \emptyset$  and  $Gt(e) \cap P \neq \emptyset$  then P is e-equilibrated.
- step 2 :  $Gs(e) \cap P \neq \emptyset$  and  $Gt(e) \cap P = \emptyset$ Then  $\exists Q \supset P$  which is partially-equilibrated and  $Gt(e) \cap Q \neq \emptyset$
- step 3 : induction on  $Card(G \setminus P)$ .

#### Lemma

Let  $e = ([C], [\overline{C}])$  be an edge of S and  $P \subseteq V(S)$  finite. Let us denote  $\mu([C]) := |(G \cdot [C]) \cap P|$ ,  $\mu([\overline{C}]) := |(G \cdot [\overline{C}]) \cap P|$ . Then P is e-equilibrated iff :

$$\mu([C])\cdot [S_{[C]}:S_e]=\mu([\overline{C}])\cdot [S_{[\overline{C}]}:S_{\overline{e}}],$$

Let us consider a path in P connecting s(e) with t(ge):

$$[C_0], \ldots, [C_i], [C_{i+1}], \ldots, [C_p]$$

where 
$$s(e) = [C_0], gt(e) = [C_p].$$
  
Let us note  $e_i$  the edge  $([C_i], [C_{i+1}]).$ 

$$\begin{split} \frac{\mu(C_0)}{\mu(C_p)} &= & \prod_{i=0}^{p-1} \frac{\mu(C_i)}{\mu(C_{i+1})} \\ &= & \prod_{i=0}^{p-1} \frac{[S_{[C_{i+1}]}:S_{\overline{e}_i}]}{[S_{[C_i]}:S_{e_i}]} \quad \text{( by the Lemma )} \\ &= & \prod_{i=0}^{p-1} \frac{|S_{[C_{i+1}]}|}{|S_{[C_i]}|} \quad \text{( since } S_{e_i} = S_{\overline{e}_i} \text{ and the groups are finite)} \\ &= & \frac{|S_{[C_p]}|}{|S_{[C_0]}|} \\ &= & \frac{[S_{[C_p]}:S_{\overline{e}}]}{[S_{[C_n]}:S_{e}]} \end{split}$$

- step 2 :  $Gs(e) \cap P \neq \emptyset$  and  $Gt(e) \cap P = \emptyset$ Then  $\exists Q \supseteq P$ , with  $Ge \cap \langle P \rangle \neq \emptyset$  which is partially-equilibrated :

$$Q' := P \cup \{g \cdot [\overline{C}] \mid g \cdot [C] \in P\},\$$

$$Q'' := \{ [\overline{C}] \} \cup \bigcup \{ g \cdot P \mid g \cdot [\overline{C}] = [\overline{C}] \}$$

and finally

$$Q := Q' \cup Q''$$
.

- step 3 : induction on  $Card(G \setminus P)$ .

#### The tile

#### Notation:

$$\mathbb{D}[C] := \bigcap_{D \sim C} C, \ \mathbb{D}[P] := \bigcup_{[C]_{\sim} \in P} \mathbb{D}[C].$$

#### The tile

#### Lemma

Let  $T := \mathbb{D}[P]$  where P is a finite, non-empty connected subset of S. Then

1- There exist a set of cuts  $\mathcal{D} = \{D_1, D_2, \dots, D_n\}$  such that

$$T = \bigcap_{i=1}^{n} D_i$$
 where  $\forall i \neq j, \ \bar{D}_i \cap \bar{D}_j = \emptyset$ 

2- If P is equilibrated then n=2m (for some  $m\geq 0$ ) and the set  $\mathcal D$  can be put under the form

$$\mathcal{D} = \{E_1^-, E_1^+, \dots, E_m^-, E_m^+\}$$

with  $\bar{E}_i^+ \in G \cdot E_i^-$  (for every  $i \in [1, n]$ ). 3- If P is complete then  $\mathbb{D}[P] \neq \emptyset$ .

## Side-pairings

#### **Theorem**

Let T be a set of vertices of  $\Gamma$ , which is finite, non-empty and can be described by

$$T = \bigcap_{i=1}^{n} E_i^- \cap E_i^+$$

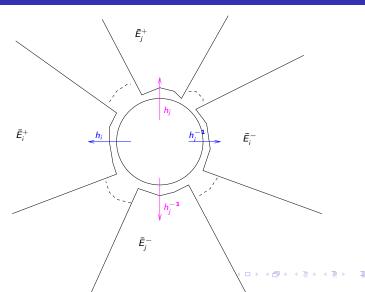
for some  $n \ge 1$  and cuts  $E_i^-, E_i^+$  with finite frontier, such that, for every  $i, j \in [1, n], \varepsilon, \eta \in \{-, +\}$ 

- $(1) (i,\varepsilon) \neq (j,\eta) \Rightarrow \bar{E}_i^{\varepsilon} \cap \bar{E}_i^{\eta} = \emptyset$
- (2)  $\forall (i,\varepsilon), \ E_i^{\varepsilon} \in G \cdot \bar{E}_i^{-\varepsilon}$

and let  $(h_i)_{i \in [1,n]}$  be elements of G such that  $h_i \cdot E_i^- = \bar{E}_i^+$ . Then

- (3) The group  $H := \langle h_i \mid i \in [1, n] \rangle$  is freely generated by the  $(h_i)_{i \in [1, n]}$
- (4)  $V(\Gamma) = \bigcup_{h \in H} h \cdot T$ .

## Side-pairings

Proof of the theorem:

- (3) < combination-lemma
- (4) < induction on the distance to the tile T.

## Muller-Schupp theorem

#### Theorem (Muller-Schupp, 1983)

Let G be a finitely generated group. G is context-free if and only if G is virtually-free.

## Free subgroup

Suppose the word-problem of G is context-free. Then :

- the Cayley-graph  $\Gamma$  of G is k-triangulated [Muller-Schupp 1983]
- the tree  $\mathcal S$  of classes of optimal cuts of  $\Gamma$  defines a subset P which is finite, connected, equilibrated and complete (Proposition 7);
- by Lemma 9  $T:=\mathbb{D}[P]$  is a finite tile (for  $\Gamma$ ) fulfilling the hypotheses of Theorem 10;
- by point 1 of Theorem 10 the subgroup H generated by the side-pairings of T is a finitely generated free subgroup;
- by point 2 of Theorem 10, T is a system of representatives of G for the right-classes modulo H, hence  $[G:H] = |T| < \infty$ .

# Context-free vertex-transitive graphs

## Adaptations

Stabilizers may be infinite.

Proof of Proposition 7:

- step 1 :  $Gs(e) \cap P \neq \emptyset$  and  $Gt(e) \cap P \neq \emptyset$ 

Use modified telescoping product :

$$\frac{[S_{[C_{i+1}]}:S_{\overline{e}_i}]}{[S_{[C_i]}:S_{e_i}]} = \frac{[S_{[C_{i+1}]}:S_{\cap}]}{[S_{[C_i]}:S_{\cap}]}$$

where 
$$S_{\cap} = \bigcap_{i=0}^{p} S_{[C_i]}$$
.

- step 2 : 
$$Gs(e) \cap P \neq \emptyset$$
 and  $Gt(e) \cap P = \emptyset$ 

Same argument.

- step 3 : induction on  $Card(G \setminus P)$ .

Same argument.

Proof of  $V(\Gamma) = \bigcup_{h \in H} h \cdot T$ :

Same argument.

## Automorphisms

Decomposition as a 3-fold unambiguous product.

$$G = H \cdot R \cdot S$$

# Context-free graphs

## Tiling a c.f. graph

Stabilizers may be infinite. Action of  $Aut(\Gamma)$  may be non-transitive.

Consider the orbit of some  $v_0 \in V(\Gamma)$ : by [L. Pelecq TCS 1985], the orbit of  $v_0$  is  $\kappa$ -connected. It can be turned into a new context-free graph  $\Gamma'$ , on which  $Aut(\Gamma)$  acts transitively.

## Automorphisms

Decomposition as a 3-fold unambiguous product.

$$G = H \cdot R \cdot S$$

where H is a free group of finite rank, R is a finite subset of G, S is the stabilizer of vertex  $v_0$  (S is profinite).

 $G \setminus \Gamma$  is context-free [GS ICALP 96]

Question : is  $\Pi: G \to G \setminus \Gamma$  rational? (for some p-structure)?

# Other problems

## Automorphisms and quotients

- P1- Characterise the 3-tuples (F, R, S) that define the automorphism groups of a c.f. graph.
- P2- Let  $\sim$  be the greatest bisimulation over  $\Gamma,$  for  $\Gamma$  context-free graph
- 2.1 Is  $\Gamma/\sim$  context-free?
- 2.2 Is the canonical projection rational?

## Cayley-graphs

P3- Cayley graphs with unique geodesics: Shapiro's conjecture: the Cayley-graph of G over X has unique geodesics implies G is a free product of finitely many finite groups with a free group of finite rank.

Partial result : true if G has presentation which is finite, confluent, monadic and strictly reduces the length [Heisenberg and alii 2019]

P4- What are the Cayley graphs where the domino-problem is decidable? raised by [N. Aubrun JCB 24].

(MSO is decidable over  $\Gamma \Leftrightarrow \Gamma$  is context-free [Kuske-Lohrey APAL 2005]).

## Infinite degree

P5- Extension of the notion of c.f. graph to arbitrary degree (ends with finite frontier, finitely many ends under end-isomorphism). Is  $Aut(\Gamma)\backslash\Gamma$  also "context-free"?

Case of trees, with (at most denumerable)-degree studied by [Courcelle 2022] : one can decide whether  $Aut(\Gamma)\setminus\Gamma$  is finite.

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## Cryptology

P6- The isomorphism problem for c.f. groups is decidable (in double-exponential time [GS-Weiss ICALP 2018]). Can we turn the difficulty of finding the isomorphism into a robust asymetric cryptographic protocol?

Alice: knows a nice presentation P of G (confluent, noetherian) with set of normal forms T.

Others : know some (random) presentation  ${\sf Q}$  of  ${\sf G}$  with a transversal  ${\sf U}$ 

Encoding of  $u \in U$  into u' (defining the same element of G).

Decoding: easy when you know P, difficult when you only know Q. Internship subject, 1st year ENS student, June 2025.
